<ul> <li>Old toys are made differently to how new toys are made.</li> <li>An older toy may be a toy that your grandparents may have played with. A newer toy may be a toy that you might play with.</li> <li>Lots of old toys were made of wood. These toys were all hand made. This meant that they took a long time to make.</li> <li>Victorian toys:</li> <li>Queen Victoria was queen in Victorian times.</li> <li>Victorian toys where made from wood, paper and metal.</li> <li>Children from rich families played with toys such as clockwork train sets, toy soldiers, tea sets, rocking horses, dolls and dolls houses.</li> <li>Children from poor families played with homemade toys such as peg dolls and wooden boats. Rags were stuffed with sawdust to make balls and toy animals. If they were lucky, poor children were sometimes bought cheap penny toys from the market.</li> <li>Girls usually played with dolls, dolls houses and tea sets</li> <li>Boys usually played with toy trains, boats, soldiers and marbles.</li> <li>In many homes, the only toy children were allowed to play with on a Sunday was Noah's Ark, because it related to the Bible.</li> <li>Victorian children enjoyed playing games too. Football was popular outdoors and children played board games like Ludo and card games like Happy Families indoors</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Rosa was taught to read by her mother at a young age and later went to a segregated, one-room school in Pine Level.</li> <li>Rosa parks would play with toys like dolls and skipping ropes.</li> <li>She wasn't first black woman who refuse to give up her seat.</li> <li>Rosa Parks fought for civil rights in the US.</li> <li>1<sup>st</sup> December 1955 Rosa Parks was told to give up her seat on the bus for a white person but she refused.</li> <li>5<sup>th</sup> December 1955 Rosa Parks was charged with breaking the rules. She was found guilty and charged.</li> <li>December 1955- December 1956 the bus boycott took place. Black people showed their support for Rosa, by refusing to use the buses.
